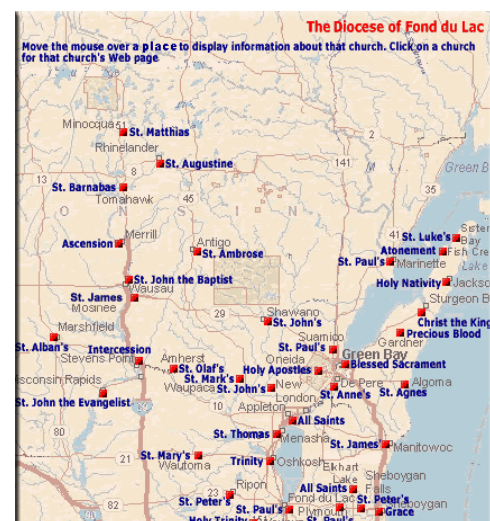

This community of disciples consists of over 6,000 souls regularly worshipping in thirty-seven locations across the



northeastern third of Wisconsin.

Originally part of the missionary district of the Northwest, then the missionary district of Wisconsin, and then the Diocese of Wisconsin, the Diocese of Fond du Lac was erected in 1875.

In 1928 it took on its present geographical dimensions when the Diocese of Eau Claire was

organized.

The geography includes twenty-seven counties lying north and west of the south line of Sheboygan, Fond du Lac, Green Lake, Marquette, Adams and Wood counties, and east of the east line of Clark, Taylor, Price and Iron counties, together with such portion of Dodge county included in the city of Waupun.

Of course the diocese is much more than just geography and buildings. It is the people of God living out their faith in an Episcopal and Anglican tradition while working together in the mission and ministry of the Gospel. It is the people serving and ministering in the communities where they live.
